

SHOLDEN CHURCH OF ENGLAND PRIMARY SCHOOL, DEAL

ADMISSION POLICY SEPTEMBER - 2015

We cater for the rising five to eleven age range in four mixed ability classes. The present roll is 104. The annual Reception Class intake is 15 (i.e. our Published Admission Number 'PAN').

Our school has weekly visiting times for prospective new parents and pupils. Parents are invited to contact the school and arrange a viewing time in order to look around the school and find out further information. We are happy to put the child's name on our register of interest for admission and send the necessary KCC pack in the December prior to admission the following September.

Sholden CEP School will adopt the Kent County Council Admission arrangements scheme together with our own additional supplementary criteria, for those families who attend Church. Sholden CEP School welcomes new entrants from a broad range of circumstances which are not solely based on an active affiliation² within the Benefice⁶ of St Leonard.

Before the application of oversubscription criteria children with a statement of special educational needs which names the school will be admitted. As a result of this the published admissions number will be reduced accordingly.

Should the number of applications exceed the number of places available; places will be allocated in order of priority as laid out below:

1. Children in Local Authority Care¹ who with their carers have an active affiliation² within the Benefice⁶ of St Leonard.
2. Children in Local Authority Care 1,
3. Children whose parents/carers have an active affiliation² within the Benefice⁶ of St Leonard.
4. Children who will have a sibling⁴ attending the school at the time of entry
5. Children whose parents/carers have an active affiliation² to a church which is part of Churches Together in England⁵.
6. Children of staff at the school
 - o Where a member of staff have been employed at the school for two years or more at the time at which the application for admission to the school is made, and/or
 - o The member of staff is recruited to fill a vacant post for which there is a demonstrable skills shortage
7. Health and Special Access Reasons⁷
8. Any other children / distance³ using the LA KCC guidance of measuring

Pupils will be ranked in order using the criteria above, if necessary distance will be used to give priority where two or more pupils have equal standing when the above criteria are applied³. In a tie breaker situation, the nearness of an applicant's home to school will be the decider. If in the event more than one applicant has the same distance from home to school (as measured by the local authority), then a random selection will be applied.

What happens if over-subscribed?

Applications are considered by a sub-committee of School Governors. Places will be allocated in line with the above order of priorities and in line with the LA co-ordinated scheme. Any parent/guardian who is refused the offer of a school place has the right of appeal and should in the first instance write to the Chairman of Governors requesting an independent appeal be heard.

Applying for a place on church affiliation grounds

Parents/carers/guardians will be required to complete a Supplementary Information Form, which is a signed statement from their church minister providing a reference for their church affiliation. Please see appendix A.

After a place has been offered the school reserves the right to withdraw the place in the following circumstances :

1. When a parent has failed to respond to an offer within a reasonable time; or
2. When a parent has failed to notify the school of important changes to the application information; or
3. The admission authority offered the place on the basis of a fraudulent or intentionally misleading application from a parent.

A map showing the Parish of Sholden can be viewed at the school office.

Late applications : Where the closing date has passed, a late application form can be provided to parents from the LA. The LA will deal with this and will send the information to schools. The school will keep children on a waiting list until September/October of each new academic year.

In the event, where arrangements are not clear, we will use the guidelines published by KCC in the Admission Booklet.

¹**Children in Local Authority Care** – a child under the age of 18 years for whom the local authority provides accommodation by agreement with their parents/carers (Section 22 of the Children Act 1989) or who is the subject of a care order under Part IV of the Act. This applies equally to children who immediately after being looked after by the local authority became subject to an adoption, residence or special guardianship order. (As defined by Section 46 of the Adoption and Children Act 2002 or Section 8 or 14A of the Children Act 1989)

² the School Governors consider ‘active affiliation’ to mean that the parents, carers and guardians are regular worshipping members and have attended services at least (**once a month**) during the 2 years prior to application. Evidence to support this will be sought from minister concerned.

³ **Nearness of children's homes to school** - we use the distance between the child's permanent home address and the school, measured in a straight line using Ordnance Survey address point data. Distances are measured from a point defined as within the child's home to a point defined as within the school as specified by Ordnance Survey. The same address point on the school site is used for everybody. When we apply the distance criterion for an oversubscribed Community or Voluntary Controlled school, these straight line measurements are used to determine how close each applicant's address is to the school.

A pupil's home address is considered to be a residential property that is the **child's only or main residence**, not an address at which your child might sometimes stay or sleep due to your own domestic or special arrangements. The address must be the pupil's home address on the day you complete your application form and which is either :-

- Owned by the child's parent, parents or guardian, OR
- Leased to or rented by the child's parent, parents or guardian under a lease or written rental agreement

If you live separately from your partner but share responsibility for your child, and the child lives at two different addresses during the week, we will regard the home address as the one at which the child sleeps for the majority of weekdays.

A block of flats has a single address point reference, so applicants living in the same block will be regarded as living the same distance away from the school. In the unlikely event that two or more children live in the same block and in all other ways have equal eligibility for the last available place at the school, the names will be issued a number and drawn randomly to decide which child should be given the place.

Where new build housing development requires a new school or the significant enlargement of an existing school the ‘Nearness’ criterion will allow for a catchment area (defined by a map) to be created for the relevant school. This will be included in the Statutory Public Notice and admissions determination and will be valid for a period not exceeding three rounds of admissions.

⁴ **Sibling** – a brother or sister in the same school at the time of entry where the family continue to live at the same address as when the sibling was admitted – or – if they have moved – live within 2 miles of the school, or have moved to a property that is nearer to the school than the previous property as defined by the ‘Nearness’ criterion’ (above). In this context brother or sister means children who live as brother and sister in the same house, including natural brothers or sisters, adopted siblings, stepbrothers or sisters, foster brothers or sisters.

If siblings from multiple births (twins, triplets, etc) apply for a school and the school would reach its Published Admission Number (PAN) after admitting one or more, but before admitting all of those siblings, the LA will offer a place to each of the siblings, even if doing so takes the school above its PAN. If the admissions are to Year R, and so result in a breach of class size legislation, the additional pupil(s) will be treated as “excepted” for a period of one year, as with excepted pupils as defined in the School Admissions Code.

⁵ **Churches Together in England** (CTE) is an ecumenical organisation and the national instrument for the Christian church in England. It helps the different Churches to work together instead of separately so that they can be more effective and credible. It works through a network of Intermediate Bodies, each covering an English county or metropolitan area and Co-ordinating Groups which bring together the Churches' officers in various areas of work. Bodies in Association with Churches Together in England are Christian organisations which, by their nature, are ecumenical but which are self-governing. The Presidents of Churches Together in England are the Archbishop of Canterbury, the Archbishop of Westminster, the Free Churches' Moderator and a fourth President chosen from one of the other member Churches

⁶ **Benefice** - the following group of Churches : Deal St Leonards with St Richard, Mill Hill; St Nicholas, Sholden and St Martin, Gt Mongeham

⁷ **Health and Special Access Reasons** – Medical, health, social and special access reasons will be applied in accordance with the school's legal obligations, in particular those under the Equality Act 2010. Priority will be given to those children whose mental or physical impairment means they have a demonstrable and significant need to attend a particular school. Equally this priority will apply to children whose parents'/guardians' physical or mental health or social needs mean that they have a demonstrable and significant need to attend a particular school. Such claims will need to be supported by written evidence from a suitably qualified medical or other practitioner who can demonstrate a special connection between these needs and the particular school.
